

When I say the word home, what comes to mind?

Is it your present physical residence? Is it house or a community where you were born or grew up? Is it a place that you went to or continue to go to that just always feels like home? Is it not a place at all, but rather a group of people that feel like home when you're with them? Is it just one of the above or are their multiple places that you experience as home?

This week the young people who are attending ECMN's Quest Camp are spending some time talking about home. Through the years I have surrounded by a number of friends and family members who count the place or people of their camp experience as home. Most describe it as a place where they feel accepted and loved, and as such, feel comfortable and at peace.

Similarly, many talk about places where they have deep roots and deep connection to both the culture and geography that brings forth a strong sense of affection and affiliation. "My family has been here for . . ." "We were founding members of . . ." "We've been going forever to . . ." are all manifestations of how some people lean into what home is for them.

For others, their narrative around home focuses on a community or group of people. It's family or friends who have a strong, shared set of experiences that creates a bond that many describe as a feeling of home when they are together.

Conversely, their are many who very much feel homeless. For some, it is quite literal, as in, they do not have a space that they feel is theirs. Yet, for a great many others who have a roof over their heads have no real sense that they have a home.

Every faith community that I have ever been in has, for those who gather regularly there, been described as a home for them. Whether it be a congregation or camp or regular gathering of the faithful, it is a place where people feel they are welcomed, accepted, and loved by those they share space and experiences with.

We who have been blessed with a strong sense of home know how life-giving it is for us. May we do all that we can to be a blessing to others to help find a place, a people that they can know as home.



More than 400 St. Louis Park children received their school supplies from STEP last year and it looks like the numbers will be about the same this year. Each child receives a bag of supplies that was asked for by his/her teacher. In order to fill those bags STEP needs your help and you can make a difference by donating critically needed supplies such as:

2 pocket folders without prongs
Plastic page protectors
5-tab binder dividers with pockets
Wide-ruled loose leaf notebook paper
College-ruled spiral notebooks
12-count Crayola colored pencils
Thick black Expo dry erase markers
Thin black Expo dry erase markers

TREE TRIMMING AND TREE REMOVAL AT ST. GEORGE'S "WE'LL GO OUT ON A LIMB FOR YOU."

Buildings and Grounds has scheduled to have five overgrown trees trimmed this summer on St. George's property. A donation of \$1,500 has been received to pay for this service. The trees chosen for trimming are the two Ginkos and the Crab Apple on the east side of the Education Building (Salem Avenue), the Red Maple in front of the Education Building on Minnetonka Boulevard, and the Sugar Maple on the west side of the Quonset building on Toledo Avenue. These trees have grown so large that they are now laying on roofs, or against buildings which prevents us from being able to paint in some instances and spray for mildew on some stucco areas.

In addition to the tree trimming, the Vestry has approved the removal of two trees. (1) The well-beloved and long-lived Crab Apple tree in the garden court has outlived itself. We believe it was planted in the 1950s. It is rotten in several areas, and some large branches have already had to be removed. We have been advised that Mother Nature will take care of it one of these days and cause it to fall to the ground (which could land on a person or on the playground fence and the corner of the church building). The plan is to plant a new disease-resistant Crab Apple tree in the spring. Thanks to Buildings and Grounds members Cyprian Troyer and Tom Zaun who have volunteered to cut down the Crab Apple tree and haul it away later this fall.


(2) The Linden tree on the west side of the Quonset building is so overgrown that it is hanging on the roof and against the side of that building. It hangs so low that it is difficult to mow under it and it also prevents the sun from reaching the grass that is trying to grow there. The Linden is also encroaching on the Sugar Maple to the north of it. If a Linden tree is trimmed dramatically (which would be the case here), it causes additional problems in the manner of sending water shoots up from each branch that is cut.
