



We gave Tom a few questions, to help reveal some of his personality and passions. Here are his answers.

Favorite word: When

someone asked my Dad (an artist) which was his favorite color, he would say "All of them!" I'm like that with words. But as with his colors, each word has to fit my purpose. It should be as precise, common, and economical as possible. (The same goes for sentences, paragraphs, and newsletter articles.) The few useless words I know always have a more precise, common, or economical alternative. I don't see the value of the verb "utilize" over the simpler, clearer, and shorter verb "use." And it's monstrous child, the noun "utilization," has no advantage over the short noun "use." ("Utilization" is use-less.)

Favorite sound: I love being outside and active. When I'm out for a walk, a bike ride, or a paddle, I leave music behind. I'd rather hear a splash in the water, wind in the trees, and the chatter of insects, frogs, and birds. Music is miraculous on its own, but I don't need a soundtrack to enhance my visit in God's creation.

Different profession:

Before retiring in February, I'd been in education for almost 50 years and in educational technology for 40. Designing engaging learning experiences for students all over the country scratched two important itches for me: being creative and being socially constructive. But given the chance for a redo, architecture might scratch the same itches in a whole different way. Maybe in my next life.

Reading or watching: I spend too much time these days reading, hearing, and watching news, analysis, and opinion. I pray for relief soon. In the meantime, I recommend a novel, Milkman (Graywolf Press), and two streaming series: Shtisel (Netflix) and Scott & Bailey (Amazon Prime Video). All have good storylines, but the value I see is in the messy lives of believable people that you can really care about.





God's Other Children: Personal Encounters with Faith, Love and Holiness in Sacred India

Bradley Malkovsky – Associate Professor at University of Notre Dame. Has studied Sanskrit and Hindu thought at the University of Poona, in Pune, India. Editor of the Journal of Hindu-Christian Studies and the winner of the Huston Smith Publishing Prize.

When he was a student of Sanskrit and Hindu studies, Catholic Christian Bradley Malkovsky moved to India to deepen his knowledge of the ancient language of India and the practice of yoga while living on a Christian run ashram. As he discovers, the spiritual life in India extends to include Buddhism, Islam and Portuguese influenced Christianity. A combination travel writing and religious studies review, "God's Other Children" is filled with small stories of the personal, the tragic and the funny that make it an engaging read, in spite of a particularly long and detailed chapter on Yoga. Accounts of the author's time spent in an Indian hospital for the poor, his visit to an Ayurvedic doctor, attending both a Muslim wedding and funeral, a disastrous trip to the barber, and almost committing a major intercultural faux pas right before his marriage to a local Muslim woman are some of the too human experiences that fill the book. Witnessing first-hand the beliefs and practices of other faiths led to an appreciation of the holy that lives within other religions and the holiness that lives within the Christian faith. Malkovsky doesn't whitewash it and show only the good, but it he does show what is good, and that makes it worthwhile food for thought.

NEWLY UPDATED MEMORIAL GARDEN AT ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH

The memorial garden at St. George's has been recently re-landscaped which included the planting of a new tree – a Korean Northwinds Maple. You may recall that last fall the very old crab apple tree and its stump were removed from the garden. The funding for this project came through donations in memory of Paul Schroeder, husband of Camille Schroeder.

Bachman's drew up a plan last fall and this spring we were finally able to begin the process. Camille and I made a trip to Bachman's tree farm in Farmington a few weeks ago to pick out a tree. Camille commented that her husband Paul loved trees, and so she felt that this was a fitting memorial in his honor.

We hope St. George's parishioners will enjoy the beauty of this garden.

This photo shows the rounded pile of woodchips where the old crab apple tree had been. The woodchips were left over after we had the tree stump drilled out last fall. Bachman's removed all of the woodchips and extended the border of variegated hostas to continue around that part of the circle.

St. George's memorial garden after the new landscaping and tree were completed.

The tree is a Korean Northwinds Maple. The leaves start out reddish in the spring, then turn green, then turn orange in the fall. (If you Google the name of the tree, you will see the fall color.) Note that the concrete border has been extended further to the west to make room for the new tree. It is hard to see in this photo, but there are three Little Lime Hydrangea bushes planted among the mulched areas. These are tiny now, but later in the summer will be much larger and will be blooming. Little Lime Hydrangea flowers start out a light green, then turn creamy white and then shades of pink in the fall. (Google the name if you want to see the colors they turn.) The blooming hydrangea bushes will give additional beauty, height and interest to the garden.



This is the side of the memorial garden that faces the church.

You can see that the concrete border has been increased from a circle to more of an egg shape to accommodate the new tree. The Little Lime Hydrangea bushes will be to the right of the bench.
