

ASK THE RECTOR

Why does it say "Jesus descended to the dead" in the apostles creed? And in some churches, "Jesus descended into Hell" What was he doing there?

You have to start with creation and the Old Covenant that God was to save His people. When that first human choice was made of indicating that God wasn't needed, God indicated that in order to be forgiven a Savior was to be sent who was His son. The statement in question is about the event (death of Christ) and the Resurrection. This is known as the D&R event. It was the event to forgive all the indiscretions and renew a covenant now called the New Covenant or the promise that He would come again. The question refers to how humans in historical recording indicated that the "rescue" for the violation in the Old Covenant was fulfilled. The words "dead" & "hell" hold, in this instance, the same meaning, now we are free from spiritual "death" and "hell," which in this case mean the same thing.

WINDOWS ON ST. **GEORGE'S**

A Monthly Tour through the Stained Glass Windows of St. George's.



Continuing our tour of the stained windows of St George's, we approach the fourth window and find the theme of the watchful Eye of God.

Window 4

Basic design in this window indicates the hand of God guiding us and the eye of God watching over us. The stones at the top represent the wrist and the arm, extending God's hand from Heaven to earth. The fingers point to the eye encircled by twelve red stones which represent the 12 apostles. The 13th red stone placed under the fingers refers to our Lord Jesus who is set in the midst of the chosen twelve. This window is placed in the nave of the church, to signify that God is watching over us.Next month is our last window, and we end with the Blessed Trinity .

DEACON DIANE

As St. George's parishioners know, Deacon Diane had Deep Brain Stimulation surgery recently at University of Minnesota Hospital to alleviate symptoms of dystonia, a movement disorder.

DBS involves implanting electrodes in precise areas of the brain, with the amount of stimulation controlled by a pacemaker-like device placed under a patient's chest. In Diane's case, this entails three separate surgeries: A five-hour procedure to implant electrodes in one side of her brain (October 5); a two-hour procedure to place the Medtronic device (October 12); and an upcoming surgery to implant electrodes in the other side of her brain (November 9).

How is she doing? Save for several days of significant pain after the first surgery she's doing guite well. But what Diane most wants St. George's to know is how grateful she is for countless prayers, get-well cards that turn her misty-eyed, enough GrubHub and DoorDash to keep me piled for weeks - and Zooming every Sunday morning with dear friends.

FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT ST GEORGE'S by Camille Schroeder

A little bit of history.

By 1950, St. George's had grown and had 505 baptized members and 235 children of Sunday School age. In order to accommodate this large Sunday School, in 1953, the church purchased a single family home that was at the east end of the lot that the church occupied (where the Christian Ed. building is now). For many years parents would take their children to Sunday School in the "white house" and then go to church in the next building. In 1956 a new Rector was called - Rev. Allen Whitman. As the church continued to grow, it became apparent that St. George's needed a new sanctuary to replace the temporary quonset hut church. Plans were drawn up and an A-frame church was designed and built at an estimated cost of \$127,000. It was dedicated on May 4, 1960. The garden area was included as part of the new plan, a memorial from the Kiewel family, which continues to be enjoyed by parishioners.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS PROJECTS UPDATES:

Two more projects were completed in the month of October by St. George's volunteers. First, our thanks to Gregg Jacobson, Kris Kelley and Carole Leonard for power washing, scraping and painting the west side of the Quonset building with two coats of white paint. It took many man/woman hours and a lot of ladder climbing to complete the job. See "Before" and "After" photos below.

Secondly, many thanks to Tom Zaun for his innovative idea to cover three of the Library Lounge exterior windows on the west side of the Quonset with painted plywood. The reason being was that one of the windows (fifth one from the left) had a large crack and a hole in it. Tom surmised that if we just boarded up the one window, it would look like a patch job. So, Tom came up with the idea to install plywood over the center three windows so there would be three clear, three painted white, and three clear which would give it a design element. Tom also installed insulation between the glass and the new wood on those three windows. The work of this project was done by Tom Zaun. See "Before" and "After" photos below.
