
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THE IMPORTANCE OF THE **EPIPHANY**

In our religious tradition, the Christmas Season is not over until the Feast of the Epiphany, generally celebrated on January 6th or on the closest Sunday to the feast day. In essence, the birthday of the Savior is not complete until the child receives his gifts. In storytelling this is a charming facet of accepted traditions, but in the matters of faith there is an essential component to this tradition: recognition!

The word "Epiphany" means manifestation or revelation. As sophisticated and educated as we may be in modern culture, are we taking the time in these days after Christmas to continue a journey which began with Advent to seek Christ? Are we setting aside prayerful time to pay him homage in these days that follow the feast of His birth? What gifts do we offer to Him?

A NOTE FROM KATHLEEN BOE

Dear St. George's Community,

As the year draws to a close, and as I look forward to celebrating Christmas in ways that I had never envisioned, I am thinking about this past year. The word that comes to mind is abundance.

I think of the many ways we have adapted and strengthened through the year.

- We quickly moved to Zoom worship and coffee hour. We are drawing community from beyond the Twin Cities with these services some new faces and some former members that have moved away. We consistently see 35 40 families on our Sunday worship.
- Music continues to enrich our services it is always so fun to hear what our choir develops under the leadership of John.
- We have re-introduced Adult Ed the discussions are engaging and we are learning more about each other.
- We continue to gather through the week through Gospel Based Discipleship, St. Mary's Circle, Compline, Carol Wednesdays, and even a book discussion group.
- While we are not "in" our building, the building and grounds crew has continued to spiff up the church with paint, tend the garden and deal with landscaping. We have a cross on the building. Our electronic sign is welcoming everyone that passes by once again.
- Our finances are fine. Pledges are down, but you have all been generous with unpledged contributions this year. Expenses are down also. Our building tenants have been steady throughout. A quick recap (through October):

Income:

YTD Gross Income: \$190,076 under budget (\$4,516) YTD Pledge Income: \$104,807, under budget (\$13,568) YTD Other Offerings: \$17,053, over budget (\$8, 363) YTD Endowment withdrawals: \$26,000 (on budget)

Expenses:

YTD Gross Expenses: \$173,644, under budget by (\$19,319)

YTD Salaries and Benefits: under budget by (\$9,953)

YTD Buildings and Grounds: under budget by (\$4,681)

YTD Utilities: under budget by (\$2,431)

I am deeply grateful to Fr. Tom's leadership through all of this. He has served our community, "manned" the church office and adapted to the technology of these new services. I am also deeply grateful for our community and for all of the things that each of you contribute to our parish life. We are blessed.

I am thinking back to an image that Sarah Schulte shared early on in the pandemic. It said "with church doors shutting across America, it is time for us to show that church has never been about the building." I think we are learning that.

It has obviously been a challenging year. And lonely for many.

I do so look forward to gathering again at the church in the new year. I am grateful for the blessings that we have received.



Historical Trivia

Remember when???? Some current members of St. George's will recall way back when this church was bulging with parishioners. There just wasn't even enough room to seat everyone that came. Christmas Eve would find the ushers setting up chairs on all the aisles to accommodate the people. Well, times have changed in many ways. Back then, in the 60's, St. George's had 11, yes 11 circles for women. They were very active and provided a lot for the church in time. talent and treasure. One historical account, in 1987, estimates that the women had raised more than \$100,000 for the church over a period of many years. They made regular contributions to the altar guild, the rector's discretionary fund, as well as costs involving church kitchen activities. They were active, involved women. Fast forward to 2020 when we now have just one circle, St. Mary's. This circle has met continuously since at the 60's.

But change happens and so it is suggested that the circle drop the circle name and become simply The Women of St. George's. All women of the parish would be part of this group. We would continue to meet on the **third Monday of the month at noon** (by Zoom at this time). Hopefully you will join us at our next meeting which will be on **January 18**, **2021**, **at noon**. Outreach Committee



A BOOK SHARE FOR THE DEEP MIDWINTER ...

The Little Book of Hygge by Meik Wiking 2016 The author is the CEO of the World Happiness Research Institute in Copenhagen. Hygge is a Danish word/concept that, loosely translated, implies as a sense of comfort, togetherness and well-being.

Although this book has been around for a few years, I only got around to reading it this year, this 2020 (!) and am very glad I did. This is the perfect little book for chasing off the winter/Covid blues. It's an introduction to a Danish concept of living that embraces all things warm and comforting. Each chapter features an aspect of Hygge that people can use all to make the home, or the office more welcoming, and more comforting. With so many people restricted to their homes, and sad about the general state of the world, Hygge can give a new light on those small details that warm up an atmosphere and in turn, warm up your mood. It includes environment, the people nearest and dearest to you, the foods that bring joy, the loveliness of nature and... lighting! Interesting what an effect lighting can have on the general mood of an environment and the people who inhabit it. With Hygge, less is often more, as in, it's more Hyggelig to enjoy a small, informal gathering of close friends over a simple meal than to attend a glamorous event with 500 of your closest friends. This is an enjoyable, gentle read, with a cover that has pleasing color tones and illustrations that give this small book a feeling of guiet, well-being. For a nice Hyggelig read, try this book. It's perfect for the deep midwinter.



BUILDINGS & GROUNDS PROJECT UPDATE

Each spring, when the ground is still frozen, and the snow begins to melt, St. George's has the problem of water backing up in the garden court. The water comes down the downspouts from the Quonset building and spills over the sidewalk and onto the handicap parking spots, and freezes. The ground in that area tilts to the north, which adds to this problem.

Buildings & Grounds member Bill Stromberg came up with the idea this fall of placing tubes of sand along that edge of the sidewalk to prevent the water from spilling onto the sidewalk this coming spring. Hopefully this will solve the problem. The tubes of sand can be stored in the shed during the summer months.

ST. LOUIS PARK EMERGENCY PROGRAM (STEP)

STEP ended 2020 on a positive note. Consider the following: Give to the Max. STEP received \$218,347 in donations which is a 35% increase over 2019. St. George's donated \$2300 to that drive which consisted of \$!200 of Outreach funds and \$1100 which was half of last year's Easter offerings. STEP is currently delivering groceries to about 50 households. Other households pick up their groceries at STEP. About 450 children received a \$30.00 gift card for Christmas gifts. This gift card took the place of the toys that children normally get. STEP continues to help with housing needs and from August to November last year they supplied over \$300,000 in housing assistance. The city and the county donated some of the funds for that purpose. It is expected that more funds will be needed for emergency housing needs when the eviction ban is lifted. Another interesting thing is that STEP now has access to the Diaper Bank of Minnesota. This will enable STEP to have access to 12,000 diapers and wipes this year. STEP does it all.

As for the coming year, STEP always needs monetary donations. You can see that it takes a lot to support all the program needs. Please mark your calendars for the annual STEP UP breakfast to be held on May 21st at 7:30 am. Virtual or real has not yet been determined but do plan to attend. Empty Bowls will be in March sometime, date to be determined. And if you know of someone in need, please refer them to STEP. Help is available. Thanks for your personal donations.
