



A LENTEN REFLECTION

How often has God put us to the test? What has been our response? This season of Lent offers us the opportunity to reflect on our interactions with God and the tests that come our way. Throughout history and the Bible, tests have played an important role in people growing in their relationship with God.

Take Abraham and his test. No matter what, the idea of God testing us can be jarring. It jumps out at you a little --- what kind of loving God is that? Yet, all of us have turned to God at some point and asked, Why? Why is this happening to me? Why is this happening to someone I love? What do you want from me right now? What are you trying to tell me?

God's ask of Abraham is unthinkable. God asks for Abraham's only child, Isaac. Isaac, the only son of a long barren couple. Isaac, child of laughter and God's promise. Isaac, the child whose ancestry is destined to become a great nation. Why would God go back on that promise in such a heartbreaking way? The horror it brings to us and must have brought Abraham is enough for anyone to question their commitment to God. If this is the cost of God's covenant, is it worth it?

The odd truth that peaks out from the corners of this traumatic story is that God wants all of us, everything! That which we love dearly, the wounds we hide, the struggles we hold. There is nothing in us or of us that God does not desire. God withholds nothing from us. It is all there for us. In this covenant, we are invited to share the same kind of love that God pours out onto us. We must love with hands open to giving all that we have.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE

OUTREACH COMMITTEE The Outreach committee was recently re-established. The committee is responsible for pursuing outreach projects for the church, presenting them to the Vestry and then seeing that their goals are accomplished. Presently, St. George's supports two main projects.

One is Perspectives and the other is the St. Louis Park Emergency Program. Perspectives provides an opportunity for our church members to work with and support children who take part in the activities of Perspectives. St. Georgites have worked with the organization's Kid's café and their summer basketball program. These programs are not functioning during Covid but we look forward to participating with them when they start up again.

The second program is STEP. While the food shelf is the most visible of STEP's programs, they also have social workers who work closely with clients to help them with housing and transportation needs. STEP also has a clothes closet (closed during Covid) where anyone from St. Louis Park can visit and choose clothes that they might need. STEP also has seasonal programs which include school supplies and holiday gifts. STEP has been in operation since 1975 and provides greatly needed services for the people of St. Louis Park.

The committee is also charged with evaluating any project that a church member might want the church to support.

Outreach will also determine which projects should be supported monetarily by the church. The committee's recommendations will be submitted to the Vestry for approval.

Committee members are Deacon Diane McGowan, Gregg Jacobson and Camille Schroeder.

A BOOK SHARE

The Way of a Pilgrim
Translated by Olga Savin

In looking for a devotional read for the Lenten season, I happen to come across this small book that I had read several years back, and remember it making a strong impression on me about the power of prayer. It was first published in Russia in 1884 and has since been translated into many languages. Published anonymously, it is uncertain whether it is a work of fiction or is autobiographical. In any case, it has been a classic in the Eastern Orthodox Christian tradition for many years. Our protagonist is an unnamed beggar/seeker who one day is struck by the Bible verse that calls us to "pray without ceasing". How can one possibly do this? And what does it really mean to pray without ceasing? Is it even possible? He begins his search for a teacher who can instruct him about what this means and even more important, how to do it. Carrying only a knapsack of dried bread, some salt and a Bible, he begins his walk through the Russian steppe, parts of Ukraine and Siberia asking God to lead him to the one who will show him the answers. Over the course of his journey through rural countryside and villages he meets peasants, monks, abbots, teachers and soldiers. Each encounter aids his journey one step at a time. His primary teacher is an orthodox monk who instructs him in the mystical and physical powers of the Jesus prayer "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me!" and introduces him to Philokalia, a collection of texts written between the 4th and 15th centuries by spiritual masters of the Eastern Orthodox Church mystical contemplative tradition. The reader is shown how God uses many personalities to help an individual on their journey of spiritual growth. Seekers of any denomination can appreciate the desire for the deeper connection to God this book illustrates, and consider how transformative to both the spirit and the body a life devoted to a simple prayer can be.

WORSHIP AT ST. GEORGE'S - THE NEXT STEPS

On February 23, 2021, the Vestry of St. George's met to discuss our current worship activity and steps to be taken to prepare to re-open the church building to worship.

All of the Vestry's decisions are guided by the ECMN Re-Gathering plan. We are also paying attention to the following concerns:

- Maintaining the health of our clergy, staff and parishioners. We recognize that many of these are in groups that are considered high risk for COVID.
- Ensuring that we provide worship and other experiences that are accessible to all. I.e., if in-person
 worship is offered, we need to be able to offer streaming services for those that are not ready or able to
 attend church in person.
- External factors such as vaccination levels and the impact of variants on effectivity of vaccines and the spread of the disease.

We also recognize that when we do gather again, things will be changed radically. The worship experience will be different. Depending on when we re-gather, practices that we have grown accustomed to, such as socializing over coffee hour, may not be possible.

As the Vestry considered options to re-gather, there was common agreement that we will not be able to gather in the near future. Too many variables with the disease are still in play.

One of the actions that we will move on immediately is the development of a re-gathering plan. The Diocese requires that this be submitted to the Diocese and approved before any re-gathering for worship can take place. The plan will include how we gather in worship, requirements for health screenings at entry, cleaning protocols, etc. This is no small undertaking. The Vestry agreed to work on a target date of May 1, 2021 to complete the plan.

We are all anxious to gather and would like to see this happen sooner. But given the various uncertainties with COVID at this time, we are unable to set a specific date for re-opening.
