# A BIT OF HISTORY

One of many memorials donated to St. George's in the early days was the Memorial Garden and the covered walkway on the north side of the church. The large boulder in the garden has a plaque on it stating that the garden was given in memory of the family of Frank Kiewel.

The family also donated the sculpture of the kneeling boy. The statue was placed in the garden with the boy looking over the roof of the church at the telephone pole cross which was on the Minnetonka Blvd. side of the church. You may remember that the cross came down during a storm not so many years ago. The American flag was also given by the family in thanksgiving for church and country.

Frank was one of the original 15 families that approached Bishop Stephen Keeler suggesting that St. Louis Park would be an excellent location for an Episcopal church. The year was 1945 and St. George's was born. Frank was the president of Grain Belt Brewery and made it possible for the church Men's Group to have a lunch or a dinner at the brewery several times – sampling all kinds of beer, playing a few card games and snacking. It was a great way to build community among the men. Obviously, Frank was way ahead of the times with his brewery events.



### ST. LOUIS PARK EMERGENCY PROGRAM

A NEW ROOF AND FASCIA FOR ST. GEORGE'S A-FRAME CHURCH by Carole Leonard, Buildings & Grounds Chair

**First, the fascia:** Last fall, as one of the secondary projects of the Renew the Dragon Capital Campaign, St. George's hired Armor Construction to cover the fascia of the east- and west-facing A-frame church with white aluminum. The current wood fascia had become almost devoid of paint. This project was to be completed last fall, but due to an early snowfall, it was moved to 2021.

And then the roof: When Armor Construction was inspecting the fascia, they noticed that the roof of the A-frame church had serious hail damage, so they offered to contact the church's insurance company. The insurance company sent out an estimator who decided that indeed St. George's had serious hail damage and they would pay for a new roof. A check was received from The Church Insurance Company for the replacement cost value minus depreciation. Once the work has been completed, and invoices and photos are presented to the insurance company for the work completed, the insurance company will pay the balance due. The only cost to St. George's will be the \$2,500 deductible on the insurance policy.

Camille Schroeder, Nancy Becker and Carole Leonard worked to get samples of roofing shingles and paint colors in order to offer a recommendation first to the Buildings & Grounds Committee, and then to the Vestry. After working through a couple different color scenarios, the decision was approved by both committees to go with Timberline's Pewter Gray shingles (see sample color below). The Episcopal Church of Minnesota also approved the project. They weren't concerned about the color; they just needed to approve the project itself. **Timing of the roofing project:** On June 15, Fr. Tom signed the contract for the roof and we presented a down payment check to Armor Construction, and they have ordered the materials. Weather permitting, the project will take five days to complete and is scheduled to begin on Monday, June 28.

**Going forward:** Once the roofing project has been completed, the Buildings & Grounds Committee will look at the possibility of having the building painted. Currently there are not funds available to cover that part of the project, so stay tuned.

Wheaties celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary this past June with a special Mohamed Ali edition.

In 1921, a health clinician in Minneapolis accidentally spilled wheat bran gruel onto a hot stove, and the result was a delicious crispy flake. She brought the result to our Washburn Crosby (WCCO) research lab, and the rest is history.

It would be three more years before the brand acquired its iconic orange box, another three years (1927) before it showcased the first singing radio commercial, and another seven years (1934) before it featured its first sports champion, Lou Gehrig. And it all started by accident.
