

## RE-OPENING OF ST. GEORGE'S

Dear St. George's Community,

We continue to move forward on our plans to re-open to in-person worship in early July. With the Vestry's approval, we submitted our re-opening plan to the Diocese on April 14. We were pleased to get a response in a matter of days. While the plan is not approved, we think the changes that were requested were minor. We plan to resubmit the plan within a week and hope for a quick approval.

Meanwhile the re-opening team has begun implementing some of the changes that will be required before we re-open. If you visit the church, you will see signage throughout indicating that masks are required and social distancing is expected. In the near future, we will implement a check-in sheet for people to use. This is critical should we need to notify people of a COVID exposure. More information to follow.

We are also beginning to implement changes for worship itself. Some things in process:

- Development of a registration tool so that you can sign up in advance to attend worship.
- Ordering individual communion kits for worship.
- Removing prayer books, hymnals and other items from the worship space.
- Planning for how people will be seated in the pews to ensure social distancing.
- Planning for arrival and exit to ensure social distancing.
- Closing off areas of the church that we will not be using, such as the parish hall (with the exception of access to the restrooms).

As we get closer to re-opening, look for more information on how we will gather together. In addition to the newsletter and weekly email, we will plan on holding a Zoom meeting to discuss the worship changes. The re-opening team (Jane Sandsmark, Bill Stromberg, Gregg Jacobson, Sarah Schulte and Kathleen Boe) is looking forward to greeting all of you when we return to in-person worship.

## BUILDINGS & GROUNDS UPDATE

**New roof for St. George's church:** Due to hail damage, the church will be getting a new roof on the A-frame church as well as a new roof over the covered walkway by the garden court. The cost of this project will be covered by the church's insurance. We have received three bids from roofing companies, and now we need to select a company to complete the work. Once the roofing company has been selected, the project will need to be approved by the Finance Committee and the Vestry.

**New fascia on A-frame church:** The Renew the Dragon Campaign Project Team designated funds to cover the fascia of the east and west facing A-frame church with a white aluminum trim. Currently the fascias are devoid of paint. The aluminum will provide a maintenance-free surface.

**Storeroom painted:** Thanks to Gregg Jacobson, Kris Kelley and Carole Leonard for painting the storeroom located in the Parish Hall.

**Playground refreshed:** Fifty bags of cedar wood chips were recently added to the playground. Thank you to the staff at Little Flowers Montessori who offered to do the work of spreading the wood chips.

**Gardening:** Geri Alberg and Carole Leonard have begun work in the gardens. Geri cleaned up the garden court gardens and Carole trimmed a lot of large branches out of the bushes that surround the church. Bill Stromberg hooked up the three garden hoses around the property. All the flower gardens have been Preened to keep the weeds at bay. This particular room has had a designated function. One of St. George's early families saw to it that the room was to be used for Alcoholics Anonymous meetings and it has been used as such for many years. It is also used for any number of committee meetings.

It is a room where basketball trophies from the early years are displayed. Yes, St. George's had a midget basketball team, but in addition, St. George's had a basketball court. Separately in this newsletter, there is an update on our re-opening plans. As I was preparing the update, I thought you would be interested in the following. These are words, paraphrased from the Reverend Timothy M. Kingsley, Canon Pastor of the Cathedral of St. Mark's in Minneapolis that we took to heart as we developed the re-opening plan:

“This will be a season that requires establishing and committing to a new covenant for each of our communities as we gather again in person. It is critical that clergy, parish leaders and community members all commit to a covenant that will demonstrate Christian love and care and provide for the health and safety of every person. As a community, we covenant to abide and hold each other accountable to these selfless actions:

- We will honestly self-assess our health condition prior to travelling to St. George's.
- We will wash our hands carefully and completely.
- We will enter our spaces with care and intention.
- We will keep the recommended safe distance from others.
- We will wear masks that cover both the mouth and nose.

If we test positive, we will not enter upon the church property for any reason and will disclose our test result to our clergy or vestry member(s) so the church can provide assistance with quarantine, medical attention and take steps for the safety of the community.

If a member of our household or family tests positive, or if we believe that we have been exposed to the virus, we will not enter upon the church property for any reason for at least 14 days, and only then after we have self-assessed and received a negative COVID test.

We will assist with compassionate contact tracing.

For us as Christians, washing hands and wearing masks become acts of care and devotion. Our masks provide only limited protection to us, but much protection to others if we are unknowing asymptomatic carriers. In doing this, we are required to acknowledge two truths. First, that we live in community and Jesus commands love for our neighbor, sometimes above ourselves. Second, that we are not invincible nor invulnerable to transmission. We are, in very practical terms, each other's keeper. As we consider how we will gather together in person again, we realize our gathering will necessarily look different than it did before this season of pandemic. We now must remember and take care to protect every person present as well as everyone with whom they will have contact.

There is no shame when we act from selfless love. We will do this out of the abundance of our Christian love and service as we commit ourselves to this community covenant.”

**A MESSAGE FROM  
THE RIGHT REVEREND  
CRAIG LOYA

Beloved in Christ,

Yesterday morning I wept as I gathered with Healing Our City's virtual prayer tent and listened to [Imam Rami Nashahibi](#) reflect on the tender, motherly, inexhaustible compassion of God. My heart, like all of yours, is so heavy, as a city that is already carrying so much is handed one more dose of sorrow and anger. As most of you know, on Sunday night Brooklyn Center police killed Daunte Wright, an unarmed Black man, during a traffic stop. Daunte's killing resulted in a night of tense but largely peaceful protests, met with tear gas and less-lethal ammunition fired at protestors, and looting of Brooklyn Center shops. While we don't know much about the circumstances of Daunte's death, we do know that he was 20 years old and a beloved child of God.

There is a sickness in our society, a sickness that shows up over and over as deadly violence against Black and brown bodies by the very institutions and agencies that form the frame and foundation of our common life. This sickness, which infects every single one of us, cannot be rooted out by our good intentions, or more knowledge, or our own efforts. This sickness is a sin that possesses us and can only be healed by the divine mercy, our mother, the God of all compassion and peace. Our first call today is to join our sorrow, our tears, our anger, our longing for a better way to the voice of Isaiah who, when facing the systemic injustice in his own society, cried out to God: "Oh that you would tear open the heavens and come down. . ." (64:1) The transformation and healing we so desperately need asks for our whole lives, and our whole life together, and it must be grounded in daily lament, crying out for God to tear open the heavens and come

down, and daily repentance, a commitment to letting the divine mercy break us open and thoroughly possess our sin-sick souls, so that each breath we are given might be an offering of God's perfect love working through us. As we continue to hold the trauma of these times, I commend to you again the incredible interfaith work being done by [Healing Our City](#). Their morning prayer vigil, held every day at 8am, is a truly healing and restorative space. You can always find a recording of the vigil after the fact on their Facebook page if you cannot attend in real time.

Oh God, tear open the heavens and come down to the family of Daunte Wright today, to the city of Brooklyn Center today, to the Twin Cities today, to the state of Minnesota today, to all who have ever feared or been hurt by police or the prison system, to all Black and Indigenous and Latine people who are disproportionately targeted by the police. Oh God, tear open the heavens and come down to us today.


