Minnetonka Boulevard Reconstruction County Road 5 in St. Louis Park Hennepin County will reconstruct Minnetonka Boulevard (County Road 5) between Highway 100 and France Avenue in St. Louis Park. Work is expected to begin in 2024.

Hennepin County continues its work evaluating the current use and design of Minnetonka Boulevard (County Road 5) between highway 100 and France Ave. The county and its partners, including the City of St.Louis Park, are developing a plan for the corridor to better serve current and future users.

In 2021, the county began an engagement process that led to the creation of potential roadway layouts based on the public feedback received. Visit



HATS OFF TO THESE LADIES!

The theater was big, bigger than the movie theaters in St. Louis Park, luxuriously furnished, with heavy deepwine curtains across a big stage, and the seats very comfortable. We were in Branson to see some live music, and The Duttons came highly recommended. When the curtains parted, we saw five or six young people – some barely more than children – playing violins and guitars and a mandolin with a young woman at a keyboard up in back on one side and a white-haired male drummer on the other. The stage was lit dramatically. Flashing lights and lasers and smoke; and the music, country-style, was just under deafening. In the next few minutes more people came on stage and burst into familiar songs, western and rock and in the brief blackouts between, they kept going off and back on stage, changing costume and instruments. I'm sure it was carefully choreographed, but it seemed as if they just got together to entertain themselves and we were permitted to watch.

They were all members of the Dutton family, a father and mother, seven grown children, their spouses and now grandchildren. I think there were even greatgrandchildren, all prodigiously gifted at song and dance. The sixteen-year-old boy did a great job tearing up "Great Balls of Fire" on an old upright piano, and five or six of them joined to show off by playing old rock hits as if they'd been composed in the era of baroque music. They sang a few familiar hymns, and they offered a mix of military anthems, asking veterans in the audience to stand as each anthem came to their branch: Army, Navy, Marine, Air Force and Coast Guard, and varied members of the family came out with the flag of the branch during its song. It was a great show; it seemed to get more exciting the further they got into it. They wound up with a furiously exciting "Boil 'Em Cabbage Down," and five minutes after they finished, you could buy a video of the show you'd just seen.

Branson, Missouri is a curious place, possibly unique. It is located in the Ozarks and so its streets are steep and pin-back curved with the sharp-edged sandstone bedrock sticking out everywhere. The scenery in the countryside is stunningly gorgeous. We bought a couple of Subway sandwiches and went out to Table Top State Park to sit beside a big lake and enjoy the birds and sunshine, and watch an old-fashioned paddle-wheeler move across.

But the town is about entertainment, big time. There are numerous theaters – professional live acts, exciting, high quality, most with lasers and flashing lights and smoke and a comic who walks on now and again and makes your face hurt from laughter, and each offered a couple of fundamentalist-type hymns and an invitation at one point for every veteran to stand and be cheered.

The underlying theme of Branson is country/western, with a strong mix of rock, comfortable music and welldone, without sex or violence. And no politics; we didn't see an FJB or Let's Go Brandon shirt or sign anywhere, nor did the comics mention the president or taxes or war. Well, one comic pretended in one skit to be a thoroughly ignorant candidate for President, and when asked if he really thought he'd be good at the job, drawled with a significant smirk, "You could do worse."

There are also several amusement parks, and odd museums, such as the one offering the world's largest collection of toys, and another featuring the history of fishing. They have a friendly little zoo called Promised Land that has Bible quotes tacked up all over the place. There's a craft mall I want to re-visit and several ziplines I don't think I care to try. There are lots of restaurants and the food is really good, hearty rather than fancy.

Branson is frankly patriotic and overtly Christian, and it caters to the law-abiding middle class. It is also booming, new construction everywhere, lots of new hotels, condos and resorts. And there are these establishments that want to talk to you, sell you a timeshare or get you out of your time-share and in its place get you a deal where you can travel anywhere in the world and stay in a high-class resort for a remarkably low price if you pay them a large chunk of money to set it up for you. You give them ninety minutes or two hours they will tell you all about it, plus give you vouchers for lowprice tickets to the shows and restaurants and museums in Branson as a reward. You don't have to go to a presentation, but they sure would like it if you'd make an appointment.

We are going back in November to see what they're doing by way of Christmas shows, and to see that show that pretends it's World War II and they are here to entertain the troops with Big Band music. Branson is a warm and friendly place and they're working hard to give you a great time.

The Angel List

A few years ago, a list of projects that could not be covered by the operating budget was created. It was envisioned that an "Angel" within St. George's would see this list of projects and hear the call to support the cost of a project.

Recently, Angels have come forward to provide the funds to cover a project on that list. (See the bolded print in this article.)

The Angel List Project which will receive the recently provided funds is to provide handicap door access. This project initially identified three doors:

1) the handicap bathroom door;

2) the interior door between the Parish Hall and the hallway from the Narthex; and

3) the exterior door between the Garden and the hallway (which is next to door #2 - the interior door leading to the Parish Hall).

The newest Angels have agreed to cover the cost of the electrician to install electricity to all three doors. They have also agreed to cover the cost of the installation of the access button for door #1 - the handicap bathroom door. An occupancy indicator deadbolt will also be installed for this door.

St. George's is so grateful to these Angels for their generosity.

Note that although electricity will be installed for all three doors to have a handicap access button installed, only the cost of the handicap bathroom door access button is covered with this gift. If a number of people wish to donate towards the other two access button installation costs, the entire project could be finished at the same time.

Thank you again to our Angels in St. George's who are making handicap access a reality in our church building.
